October 25, 2013	EPA made a determination that the Liberty-Clairton area had attained the 1997 annual standard (15.0 ug/m³) by the applicable attainment date of December 31, 2011, which had the effect of suspending the County's obligation to perform various	78 Fed. May 2, 2014	EPA made a determination that the Pittsburgh-Beaver Valley area had attained the 2006 24-hour PM2.5 standard (35 ug/m³) as of May 2, 2014, which had the effect of suspending the obligations of the County to perform various actions to achieve attainment with this particular standard, under its Clean Data Policy. These actions include (1) the requirements for this area to submit an attainment demonstration, (2) associated reasonably available control measures, (3) a reasonable further progress plan, (4) contingency measures, and (5) other planning SIPs related to attainment of the standard.	79 Fed. Technical Support Document: Area Designations for the PM2.5 Primary Annual National Ambient Air Quality Standard	On July 30, 2014, the Commonwealth had proposed to designate all of Allegheny County as an attainment area for the 2013 annual standard, with the exception of Liberty-Clairton, because only the design values for Liberty Clairton showed nonattainment. EPA disagreed with the Commonwealth's recommendation to limit the nonattainment area to Liberty-Clairton, because all of Allegheny County continues to contribute to the design value exceedances in Liberty-Clairton. Therefore, EPA determined that all of Allegheny County will continue to be	

	designated as nonattainment for the annual PM2.5 standard.	
April 7, 2015	This notice corrects the error in the previous notice in which EPA designated the "remainder" of Allegheny County as being unclassifiable/attainment (80 Fed.
